Information on chemicals

State of play

- Registered substances information (> 12 700 substances; 49 100 dossiers; > 2 million study summaries)
- Classification and Labelling Inventory (EU harmonised classification for ~4 500 substances; Classification for > 118 000 substances; > 6 million notifications)
- Substances of Very High Concern (SVHC) (151 substances in the candidate list)
- Information on Active substances (64 substances) and Biocidal products
- EC Inventory (106 213 substances from EINECS, ELINCS and NLP)
- Dossier evaluation decisions
- Lists of restricted substances and substances subject to authorisation, substances planned for evaluation by MS (CoRAP), etc.

- Support citizens to make informed decisions on the safe use of chemicals

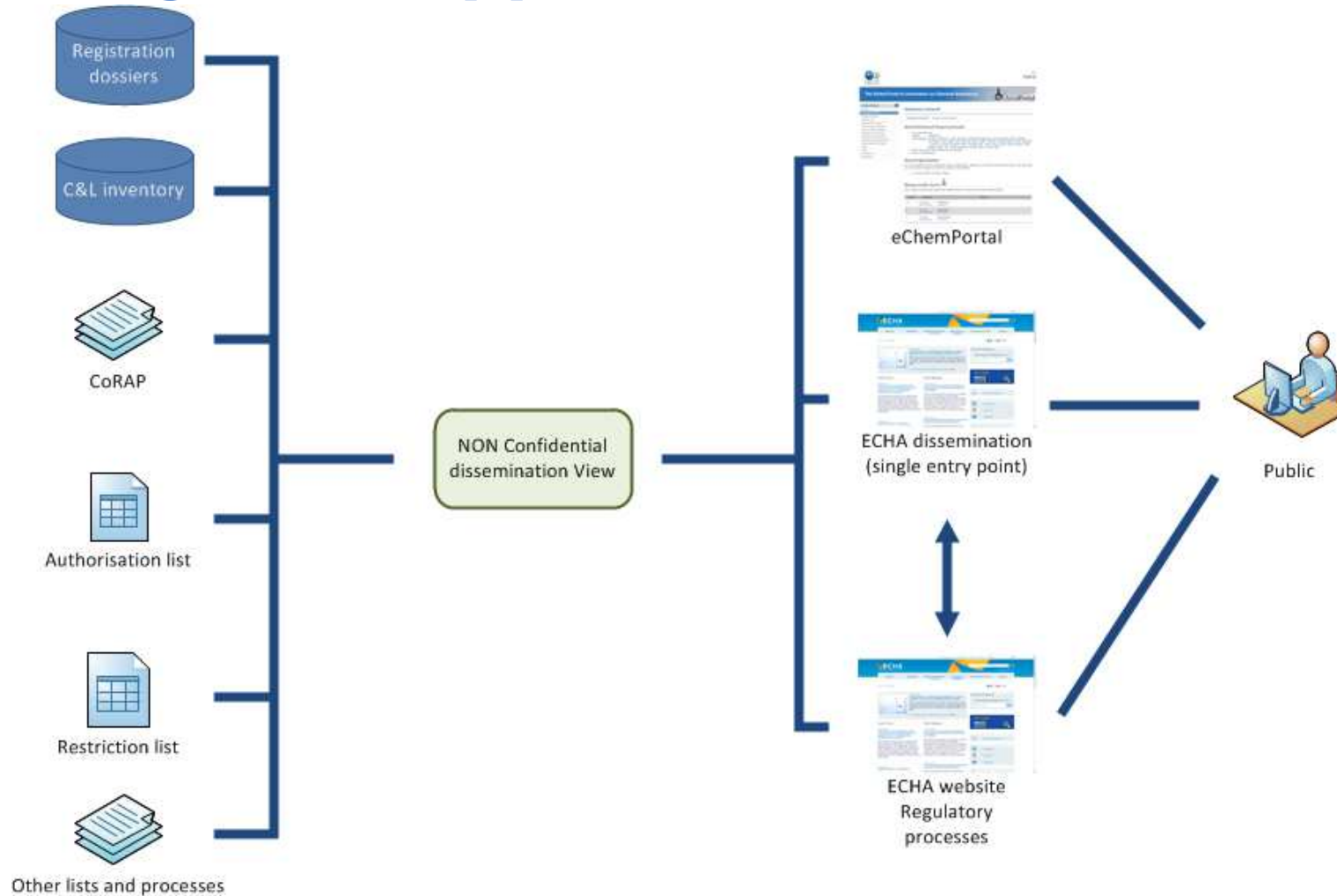
Legal basis in the EU chemicals Regulations

REACH	
ECHA to make information on substances publicly available over the internet, free of charge; Brief Profiles of hazardous properties, labelling requirements and Community legislation available to citizens;	Articles 77(2)(e), 118 & 119 Recital 117
Biocidal products (BPR)	
ECHA to make publicly and easily available, free of charge, information on active substances, biocidal products, and non-confidential parts of assessment reports ;	Articles 66, 67 & 76
Classification, Labelling & Packaging (CLP)	
ECHA to make publicly accessible the C&L inventory;	Article 42
Export & Import of Hazardous chemicals (PIC)	
ECHA to make publicly available on its website the database on export and import of hazardous chemicals;	Article 6

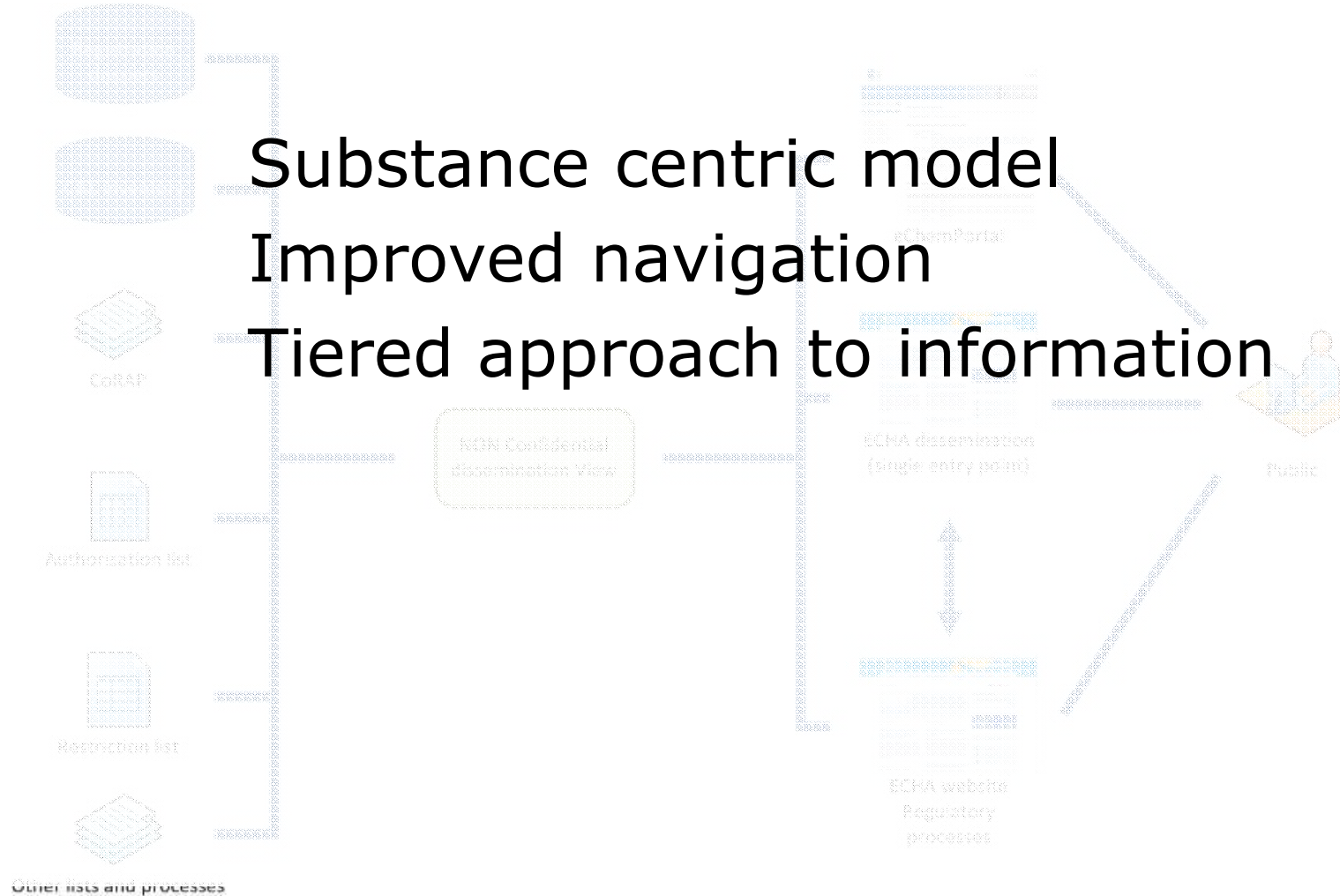

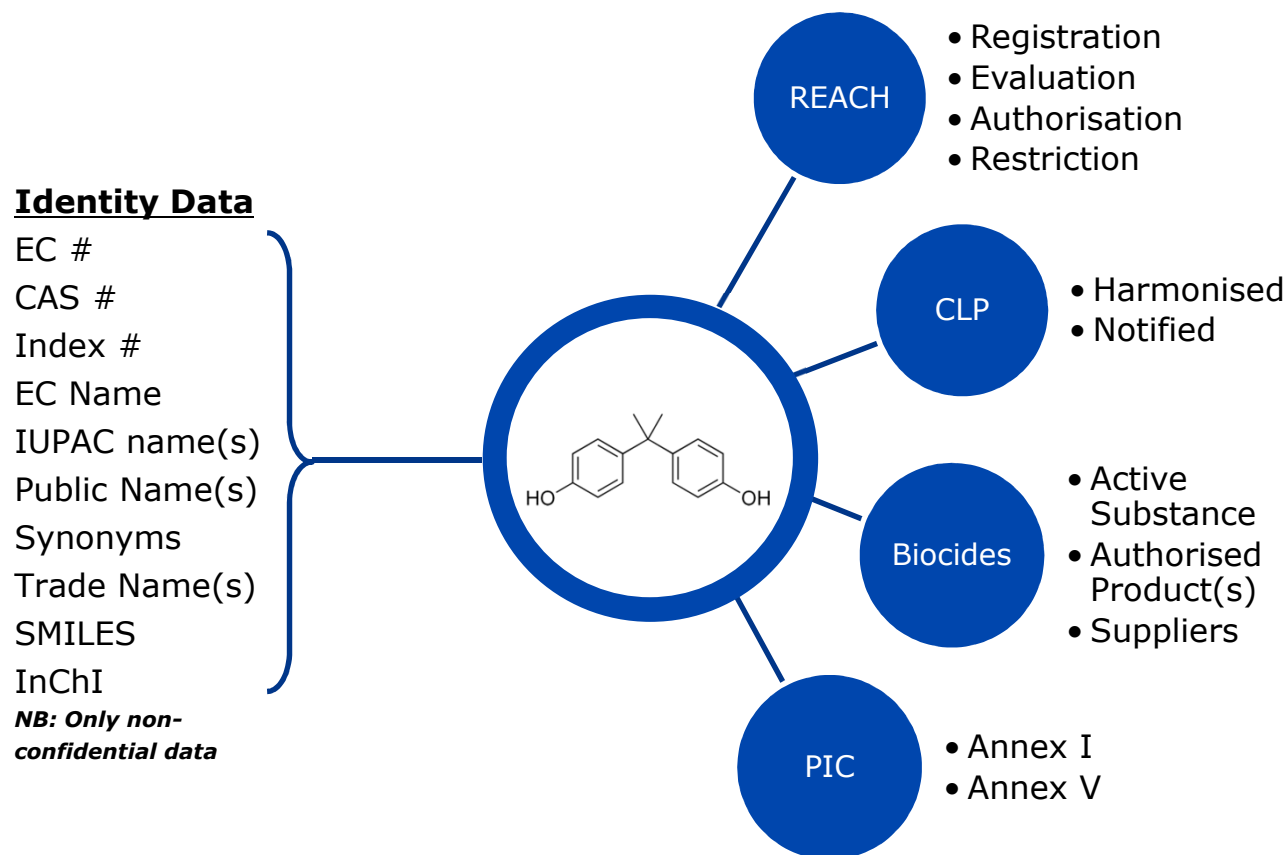

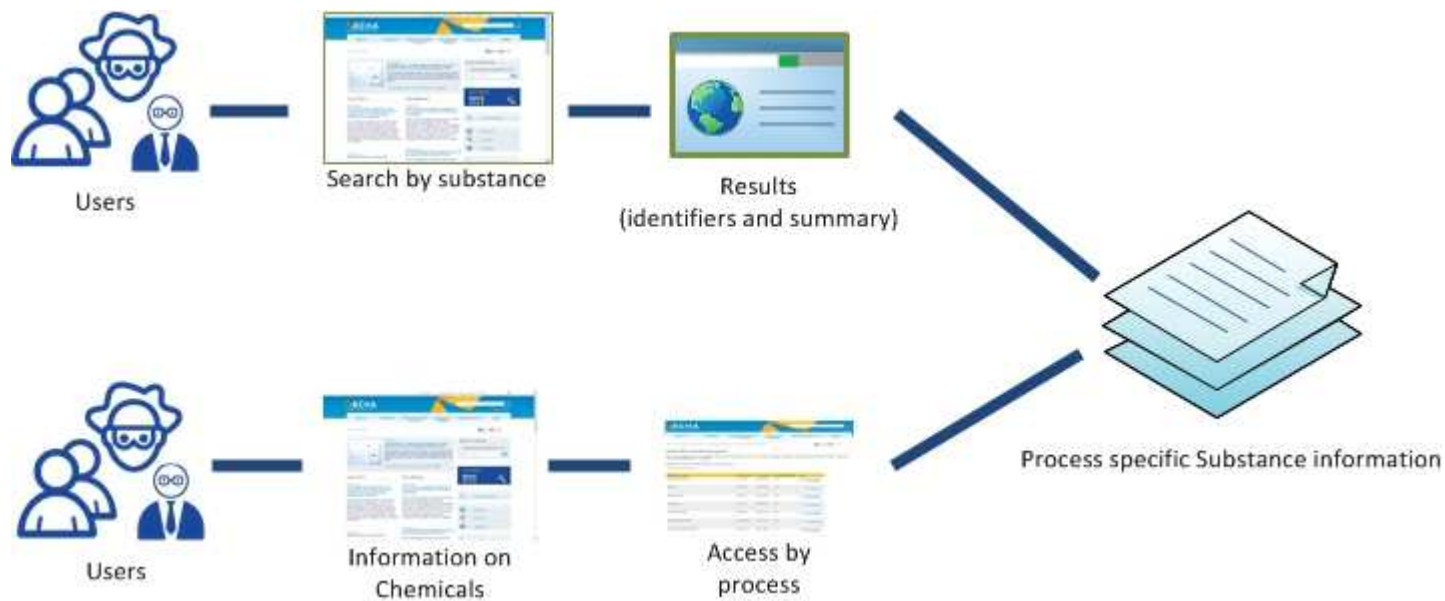

Substance centric model



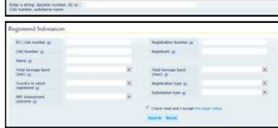

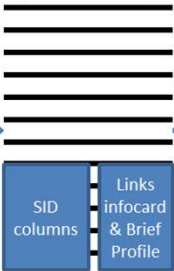
Information on Chemicals Simple / Advanced Searches



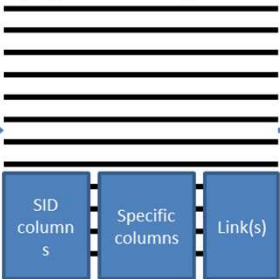
Information on Chemicals > ... Specific Searches



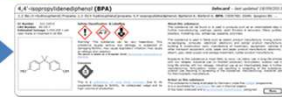

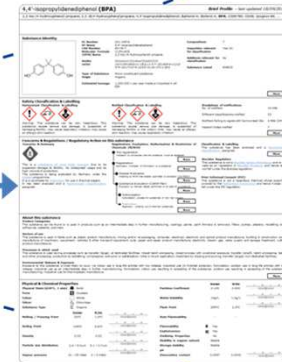

Substance Brief Profiles - background

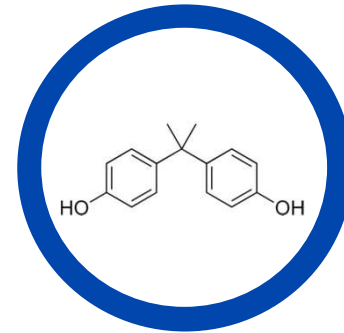
- **Stakeholders' engagement study**

Highlight the need for a user-friendly access to summarised information and download functionalities

- **REACH recital 117**

***EU citizens** should have access to **information** about **chemicals** to which they may be **exposed**, in order to allow them to make **informed decisions about** their **use** of chemicals. A transparent means of achieving this is to grant them free and easy access to basic data held in the Agency's database, including **brief profiles of hazardous properties, labelling requirements and relevant Community legislation including authorised uses and risk management measures.** (...)*



Infocard vs. Brief Profile

Info card (*1st tier*)

- Allow users to further identify the substance
- Provide high-level information to concerned citizens
 - substance's critical properties
 - Classification
 - uses and exposures
- Provide an overview of main regulatory processes on-going for the substance

Substance Brief Profile (*2nd tier*)

- Extend Info card information
 - Overview of C&L inventory notified classifications
 - Information on substance identity
- Provide information on:
 - Physical chemical properties,
 - Environmental fate and pathways
 - Ecotoxicological Information
 - Toxicological Information
 - Study records type overview
- Provide the information in downloadable format
- Provide links to the source data
