
1. Why customs?

- Customs is the 'door' to the EU single market
- Having the ambition to have a sophisticated EU chemical legislation increases work at the borders
- Improve the ratio of compliance for imported goods (see graph)

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- REACH enforcement, a MS responsibility
 ... MS shall maintain a system of official controls and other activities ...'
- REACH reviews highlighted the importance of enforcement
- The 2018 REACH review states: '...clarify and enhance the role of REACH enforcement authorities and customs authorities...under the relevant legislative instrument...'





2. What has been done?

- Legal work (e.g. interpretation of REACH articles 'under customs supervision', customs authorities as REACH enforcement authorities)
- Guidelines for enforcement authorities (REACH and customs): Understanding each other
- Networks cooperation: PARCS and Forum.
 Cooperation and carrying out an enforcement project together





2. What has been done?

- Forum projects involving customs: More common
- Learn from other sectors
 - Food safety online
 - E-enforcement academy (consumer products)
- Use other EU legislation
 - Consumer protection regulation (EC 2017/2394)
 - e-commerce (Digital single Market)
 - New Market surveillance Regulation Regulation (EU 2019/1020) e.g. ICSMS (IT system for enforcement authorities)





3. What are we currently doing?

- Could we take an EU approach?
- Further integration in the current framework
 - Evaluate the REACH requirements that can be integrated in customs procedures
 - Evaluate which customs procedures can contribute to the enforcement of REACH
- Step by step approach. Why?



3. What are we currently doing?

- TARIC: 'the integrated Tariff of the European customs Union'
 - multilingual database integrating and coding all measures relating to EU legislation (customs tariff, commercial and agricultural).
 - facilitates uniform application by all MS
 - all economic operators a clear view of measures to be taken when importing/exporting goods
 - possibility to carry out EU-wide statistics for the concerned measures.

<u>Goal</u>

maximising automatic customs clearance

- daily transmissions of TARIC data via an electronic network guarantee immediate and correct information for the national administrations of the MSs,
- MS use TARIC data mainly to feed their national systems for customs clearance



3. What are we currently doing?

- Integration of REACH Annex XIV substances in **TARIC**
 - If you import an Annex XIV substance
 - a) You provide a valid authorisation, or
 - b) You are exempted, thus a valid reason

Operational since October 1st

Integration of REACH Annex XVII substances in Operational by the **TARIC**

end of this year





4. Something left for the future?

- Single window (DG TAXUD big project)
 - Facility which allows parties involved in trade and transport to lodge standardised information and documents with a single entry point to fulfill all import, export and transit-related regulatory requirements
 - Enable economic operators to electronically lodge, and only once, all the information required by customs <u>and</u> <u>non-customs legislation</u> for EU cross-border movements of goods
 - If information is in electronic form, the individual data elements should be submitted only once





4. Something left for the future?

- Development of new frameworks (legislative?) to integrate better chemical Regulations in customs procedures
- Coordination plans with other sectors
- Contribute to horizontal toolbox with methods and techniques used (e.g. images and websites)
- Use of big data for enforcement (of chemicals)
