








Chemicals: a cross-cutting challenge

- Diseases/biodiversity loss linked to chemicals
- Amount/diversity of chemicals & production trends
- 74% chemicals hazardous to health/environment
- 90% citizens concerned about impact of chemicals;

500 billion € chemicals industry







The European Green Deal



COM will present a chemicals strategy for sustainability:

- To help protect citizens and the environment and encourage innovation for safe and sustainable alternatives
- To combine better health and environmental protection and increased global competitiveness.
 - by simplifying and strengthening the legal framework
 - moving to 'one substance one assessment'
 - to rapidly reflect scientific evidence on the risk posed by endocrine disruptors, hazardous chemicals in products including imports, combination effects of different chemicals and very persistent chemicals

- Adoption: expected for later this year
- Follow-up proposals and implementation: 2021-2024:
