DECISION ON TESTING PROPOSAL(S) SET OUT IN A REGISTRATION PURSUANT TO ARTICLE 40(3) OF REGULATION (EC) NO 1907/2006

For 4-methylthiosemicarbazide, EC No 229-563-2 (CAS No 6610-29-3),

The European Chemicals Agency (ECHA) has taken the following decision in accordance with the procedure set out in Articles 50 and 51 of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 concerning the Registration, Evaluation, Authorisation and Restriction of Chemicals (REACH Regulation).

I. Procedure

Pursuant to Article 40(1) of the REACH Regulation, ECHA has examined the following testing proposals submitted as part of the registration dossier in accordance with Articles 10(a)(ix) and 12(1)(d) thereof for 4-methylthiosemicarbazide, EC No 229-563-2 (CAS No 6610-29-3), submitted by (Registrant).

- 90-day oral toxicity study (OECD 408) in rats, oral route;
- Developmental toxicity / teratogenicity study (OECD 414) in rats oral route; and
- Long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates (OECD Guideline 211; *Daphnia magna* Reproduction Test).

This decision is based on the registration as submitted with submission number , for the tonnage band of 100 to 1000 tonnes per year. This decision does not take into account any updates after 18 June 2015, i.e. 30 calendar days after the end of the commenting period.

This decision does not imply that the information provided by the Registrant in his registration dossier is in compliance with the REACH requirements. The decision does not prevent ECHA from initiating a compliance check on the registration at a later stage.

ECHA received the registration dossier containing the above-mentioned testing proposals for further examination pursuant to Article 40(1) on 20 August 2013.

ECHA held a third party consultation for the testing proposals from 18 September 2014 until 3 November 2014. ECHA received information from third parties only concerning the testing proposal for 90-day oral toxicity study (OECD 408) in rats.

On 9 April 2015 ECHA sent the draft decision to the Registrant and invited him to provide comments within 30 days of the receipt of the draft decision. That draft decision was based on submission number

On 11 May 2015 ECHA received comments from the Registrant agreeing to ECHA's draft decision regarding the performance of the pre-natal developmental toxicity study in rats by oral route and the long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates. With regard to

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repeated dose toxicity the Registrant commented that the substance will be classified as STOT RE 1 in an updated registration dossier. Consequently, the Column 2 adaptation in Annex IV, Section 8.6.2 would apply and hence there would be no requirement to perform the study.

On 11 May 2015 the Registrant updated his registration dossier (). In the updated dossier, the Registrant self-classified the substance as STOT RE 1 and removed the proposal to perform the sub-chronic toxicity study (90-day; OECD 408) in rats. ECHA therefore considers that there is no testing proposal for sub-chronic toxicity study in rats.

The ECHA Secretariat considered the Registrant's comments and update. On basis of this information, Section II was amended. The Statement of Reasons (Section III) was changed accordingly.

On 23 July 2015 ECHA notified the Competent Authorities of the Member States of its draft decision and invited them pursuant to Article 51(1) of the REACH Regulation to submit proposals for amendment of the draft decision within 30 days of the receipt of the notification.

As no proposal for amendment was submitted, ECHA took the decision pursuant to Article 51(3) of the REACH Regulation.

II. Testing required

A. Tests required pursuant to Article 40(3)

The Registrant shall carry out the following proposed tests pursuant to Article 40(3)(a) and 13(4) of the REACH Regulation using the indicated test methods and the registered substance subject to the present decision:

- 1. Pre-natal developmental toxicity study (Annex IX, Section 8.7.2.; test method: EU B.31/OECD 414) in rats or rabbits, oral route; and
- 2. Long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates (Annex IX, Section 9.1.5.; test method: *Daphnia magna* reproduction test, EU C.20/OECD 211).

Note for consideration by the Registrant:

The Registrant may adapt the testing requested above according to the specific rules outlined in Annexes VI to X and/or according to the general rules contained in Annex XI of the REACH Regulation. In order to ensure compliance with the respective information requirement, any such adaptation will need to have a scientific justification, referring to and conforming with the appropriate rules in the respective Annex, and an adequate and reliable documentation.

Failure to comply with the requests in this decision, or to fulfil otherwise the information requirements with a valid and documented adaptation, will result in a notification to the Enforcement Authorities of the Member States.

B. Deadline for submitting the required information

Pursuant to Articles 40(4) and 22(2) of the REACH Regulation, the Registrant shall submit to ECHA by **19 September 2016** an update of the registration dossier containing the information required by this decision, including, where relevant, an update of the Chemical Safety Report. The timeline has been set to allow for sequential testing as appropriate.



III. Statement of reasons

The decision of ECHA is based on the examination of the testing proposals submitted by the Registrant for the registered substance and scientific information submitted by third parties.

A. Tests required pursuant to Article 40(3)

- 1. Pre-natal developmental toxicity study (Annex IX, Section 8.7.2.)
- a) Examination of the testing proposal

Pursuant to Article 40(3)(a) of the REACH Regulation, ECHA may require the Registrant to carry out the proposed test.

A pre-natal developmental toxicity study for a first species is a standard information requirement as laid down in Annex IX, Section 8.7.2. of the REACH Regulation. The information on this endpoint is not available for the registered substance but needs to be present in the technical dossier to meet the information requirements. Consequently there is an information gap and it is necessary to provide information for this endpoint.

The Registrant has submitted a testing proposal for a pre-natal developmental toxicity study in rats according to EU B.31/OECD 414 without further justification.

ECHA considers that the proposed study is appropriate to fulfil the information requirement of Annex IX, Section 8.7.2. of the REACH Regulation.

The Registrant proposed testing in rats. He proposed testing by the oral route. According to the test method EU B.31/OECD 414, the rat is the preferred rodent species, the rabbit the preferred non-rodent species and the test substance is usually administered orally. ECHA considers these default parameters appropriate and testing should be performed by the oral route with the rat or the rabbit as a first species to be used.

b) Consideration of the information received during third party consultation

ECHA did not receive third party information concerning this the testing proposal.

c) Outcome

Therefore, pursuant to Article 40(3)(a) of the REACH Regulation, the Registrant is requested to carry out the proposed study with the registered substance subject to the present decision: Pre-natal developmental toxicity study in rats or rabbits, oral route (test method: EU B.31/OECD 414).

- 2. Long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates (Annex IX, Section 9.1.5.)
- a) Examination of the testing proposal

Pursuant to Article 40(3)(a) of the REACH Regulation, ECHA may require the Registrant to carry out the proposed test.

"Long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates" is a standard information requirement as laid down in Annex IX, Section 9.1.5. of the REACH Regulation. The information on this endpoint is not available for the registered substance but needs to be present in the

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technical dossier to meet the information requirements. Consequently, there is an information gap and it is necessary to provide information for this endpoint.

The Registrant has submitted a testing proposal for long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates [Daphnia magna reproduction test, EU C.20/OECD 211 with the following justification: "According to claimed uses of 4-methylthiosemicarbazide aquatic compartment exposure is likely. At the moment no data is available for characterizing 4-methylthiosemicarbazide long-term effects on organisms inhabiting aquatic compartment. Risk assessment demonstrated that there is a risk for those organisms using the PNEC derived based upon acute data, that's why a long-term test on aquatic invertebrates is proposed in order to refine the PNEC value". ECHA considers that the proposed study is appropriate to fulfil the information requirement of Annex IX, Section 9.1.5 of the REACH Regulation.

According to ECHA Guidance on information requirements and chemical safety assessment (version 2.0, November 2014), Chapter R7b (Section R.7.8.5 including Figure R.7.8-4), if based on acute aquatic toxicity data neither fish nor invertebrates are shown to be substantially more sensitive, long-term studies may be required on both. There were no indications in the dossier from the short-term toxicity studies on aquatic species that the fish would be substantially more sensitive than aquatic invertebrates. In such case, according to the integrated testing strategy, the Daphnia study is to be conducted first. If based on the results of the long-term Daphnia study and the application of a relevant assessment factor no risks are observed (PEC/PNEC<1), no long-term fish testing may need to be conducted. However, if a risk is indicated, long-term fish testing may need to be conducted.

b) Outcome

Therefore, pursuant to Article 40(3)(a) of the REACH Regulation, the Registrant is required to carry out the proposed study using the registered substance subject to the present decision: Long-term toxicity testing on aquatic invertebrates (Annex IX, 9.1.5.; test method: *Daphnia magna* reproduction test, EU C.20/OECD 211).

Notes for consideration by the Registrant:

Once results of the proposed test on long-term toxicity to aquatic invertebrates are available, the Registrant shall revise the chemical safety assessment as necessary according to Annex I of the REACH Regulation. If the revised chemical safety assessment indicates the need to investigate further the effects on aquatic organisms, the Registrant shall submit a testing proposal for a long-term toxicity test on fish in order to fulfil the standard information requirement of Annex IX, 9.1.6. If the Registrant comes to the conclusion that no further investigation of effects on aquatic organisms is required, he shall update his technical dossier by clearly stating the reasons for adapting the standard information requirement of Annex IX, 9.1.6.

B. Deadline for submitting the required information

In the draft decision communicated to the Registrant the time indicated to provide the requested information was 24 months from the date of adoption of the decision. This period of time took into account the fact that the draft decision also requested a sub-chronic toxicity study (Annex IX, 8.6.2). As the testing proposal for this study is not addressed in the present decision, ECHA considers that a reasonable time period for providing the required information in the form of an updated registration is 12 months from the date of the adoption of the decision. The decision was therefore modified accordingly.



IV. Adequate identification of the composition of the tested material

The process of examination of testing proposals set out in Article 40 of the REACH Regulation aims at ensuring that the new studies meet real information needs. Within this context, the Registrant's dossier was sufficient to confirm the identity of the substance to the extent necessary for examination of the testing proposal. The Registrant must note, however, that this information has not been checked for compliance with the substance identity requirements set out in Section 2 of Annex VI of the REACH Regulation.

In addition, it is important to ensure that the particular sample of substance tested in the new studies is appropriate to assess the properties of the registered substance, taking into account any variation in the composition of the technical grade of the substance as actually manufactured. If the registration of the substance covers different grades, the sample used for the new studies must be suitable to assess these.

Finally, there must be adequate information on substance identity for the sample tested and the grade(s) registered to enable the relevance of the studies to be assessed.

V. Information on right to appeal

An appeal may be brought against this decision to the Board of Appeal of ECHA under Article 51(8) of the REACH Regulation. Such appeal shall be lodged within three months of receiving notification of this decision. The notice of appeal will be deemed to be filed only when the appeal fee has been paid.
